Oluo. Running February 20–22, 2026 at the Robert J. Orchard Stage at the Emerson Paramount Center, the performance blends stunning multi-layered music, created on the spot with looping technology, and intimate storytelling to reveal the surprising beauty hidden in everyday life.

With a trumpet, live looping technology, and an expertise for rhythm and narrative, Oluo builds an entire symphony onstage, layering sound and story. Weaving hilarious personal anecdotes with moments of striking

emotional depth, **The Things Around Us** invites audiences to rethink what surrounds them and discover the extraordinary in the ordinary.

The Things Around Us is the third installment in Oluo's celebrated trilogy, following *Now I'm Fine* and *Susan*. The 90-minute performance showcases Oluo's signature ability to transform simple sounds into sweeping musical landscapes while delivering stories that are heartfelt, hilarious, and profoundly human.

"In some ways, **The Things Around Us** is a simple and direct show," explains Ahamefule J. Oluo — "just a performer and an audience in a room, experiencing sounds, words, and lights. That's it. Which means that the space contributes significantly to our shared experience. The Emerson Paramount Center's Robert J. Orchard Stage is one of the most beautiful venues in the country. It takes my breath away. I'm so grateful to ArtsEmerson for bringing this show to Boston and I'm counting down the days until opening night when I can share this space with you."

Oluo has an extraordinary gift for turning sound, story, and spontaneous moments into something moving and unexpectedly joyful," says Ronee Penoi, Interim Executive Director of the Office of the Arts & Director of Artistic Programming at ArtsEmerson. Community Engagement Programming: Play Reading Book Club

ArtsEmerson invites audiences to deepen their experience of **The Things Around Us** through its **Play Reading Book Club** (PRBC), a four-week, community-based program designed for both seasoned theatergoers and those new to live performance.

Participants read the play aloud together and explore the script through guided discussion and dialogue facilitated by a trained teaching artist. After completing the group reading, participants attend a performance together and are invited to a private reception with artists from the production.

Along the way, participants gain insight into the artistic context and background of the work, learn practical theater-going tips, and build meaningful social connections through thoughtful conversation.

Participants will:

- Engage in deep exploration of the play through group readings, facilitated discussion, and curated contextual resources.
- Meet new people and strengthen social connectedness through meaningful conversation.
- Gain tools and confidence to navigate the theatergoing experience.
- Experience the performance with a deeper level of understanding and appreciation.

CREDITS & BIOGRAPHIES

Composed, Written & Performed by: Ahamefule J. Oluo

Ahamefule J. Oluo (they/them) is a multi-instrumentalist, composer, writer, comedian, and creator of live performance. They were a founding member of the award-winning experimental jazz quartet Industrial Revelation and have been recognized with a Mellon Creative Research Fellowship, a Creative Capital award, the Artist Trust Arts Innovator Award, a MAP Fund award, and a Foundation for Contemporary Arts grant.

Oluo co-produced comedian Hari Kondabolu's albums *Waiting for 2042* and *Mainstream American Comic* for Kill Rock Stars, as well as *Who the Hell is Dwayne Kennedy?* by the eponymous stand-up legend. Their writing credits include the HBO Max series *Santa Inc.*, created by Sarah Silverman and Seth Rogen, and they've appeared on *This American Life*.

Oluo's two autobiographical music-performance works, *Now I'm Fine* (2016) and *Susan* (2019), had their New York City premieres at The Public Theater's Under the Radar Festival. *Now I'm Fine* was described by *The New York Times'* Ben Brantley as "a New Orleans funeral march orchestrated by Arnold Schoenberg," while *Time Out New York's* Helen Shaw wrote, "A day later, it's as though I grabbed a live wire; I can still feel the electricity in my skin." *Susan* was described by Brantley as "virtuosic" and "crackerjack."

Now I'm Fine was adapted into the feature film *Thin Skin* (2020), which Oluo co-wrote, scored, and starred in. *Thin Skin* won Best Director (Charles Mudede) at the Harlem Film Festival.

Oluo has been an artist-in-residence at Portland Institute for Contemporary Art (PICA), Seattle Repertory Theatre, MacDowell, and Yaddo. They have been commissioned, presented, and/or invited by the Under the Radar Festival, On the Boards, PICA, University of Washington's Meany Center for the Performing Arts, University of Maryland's The Clarice, Fusebox Festival, Seattle Theatre Group, Seattle Rep, Stanford University's Cantor Arts Center, Oklahoma City Rep, Intiman Theatre, Williamstown Theatre Festival, ArtsEmerson, The Ringling Museum's Historic Asolo Theatre at FSU, REDCAT, Transform Festival in Leeds, England, and more.

Their recent evening-length work, *The Things Around Us*—a solo comedy/music stage performance featuring live-looping of trumpet, clarinet, and household objects—premiered at PICA's Time-Based Art Festival in September 2024 and had its New York City premiere at La MaMa ETC as part of the 2025

Under the Radar Festival. Supported by a MAP Fund grant, the piece has been actively touring, with engagements at Stanford University's Cantor Arts Center (CA), Intiman Theatre (Seattle, WA), Williamstown Theatre Festival (MA), Field Hall (Port Angeles, WA), Transform Festival (Leeds, UK), ArtsEmerson (Boston, MA), and forthcoming at The Ringling Museum/Historic Asolo Theater (Sarasota, FL) and Fusebox Festival (Austin, TX).

Oluo resides on the unceded lands of the Twana people on the Olympic Peninsula in rural Washington State.

Roya Amirsoleymani is a curator, writer, creative producer, and project manager in contemporary performance and visual art, based rurally on Twana lands on Washington's Olympic Peninsula. She has served as creative producer for new, interdisciplinary performance works by San Cha, Ahamefule J. Oluo, and Holland Andrews & yuniya edi kwon; as a consultant for National Performance Network and the International Presenting Commons; and in Seattle, as co-curator of the 2023 Out of Sight exhibition at Bumbershoot and the 2025 Northwest New Works Festival at On the Boards. From 2012-2023, she was an artistic director and curator at Portland Institute for Contemporary Art (PICA), where she curated and organized visual art exhibitions, experimental dance and theatre, residencies, public programs, community events, grant making initiatives, and the annual, globally renowned Time-Based Art Festival. Internationally, nationally, and regionally, her practice has also spanned research, writing, symposia, publications, public art, book making, and cultural policy and advocacy. As a creative writer, she is developing a long-form experimental narrative and archival project about death and friendship. Across all her work, she strives for anti-racism, equity, and justice.
